

In the world of (health and) safety, we teach something called mentioned above, he the "Swiss Cheese model", the concept being that in any managed to find time to put disaster there are often three or more "failsafes" that actually together our members' failed. In our case - a player's cardiac arrest in the Dedans survey. after a Night Pennant match on 2nd March - it was the opposite.

Nick Wood had led a discussion about the defibrillator just best amateur. He will be four days prior; a Professional was on duty; there was no missed, particularly at Pol delay in getting to the victim - David Peregine-Jones - and no delay in getting the machine. The machine had been maintained and was ready. The playing members present did their part, calling 999 and assisting wherever possible; the operator (Nick Wood himself) was trained, working quickly and calmly; the Palace team were immediately active to support CPR and to direct the ambulance, leading to a successful resuscitation.

According to NICE, fewer than one in 10 people survive an out around the goal for a tap-in. It's been nine years of high work -of-hospital cardiac arrest. Both RTC and the Palace have already conducted a review to assist us in making use of the experience ready for the next occurrence, whatever and whenever that may be. The Ambulance Service are preparing a press release citing this case as an exemplar. Most importantly, at time of writing, David P-J is recovering well and has kept us up to date through regular contact. He sends his thanks for your concerns and recovery wishes.



As the curtain of Peter Wright's inspirational Real Tennis career draws to a close, a new journey beckons with padel - and a chance to become the new kid on the block again!

Recent advice from knee specialists urged him to bid farewell to competitive Real Tennis - and Peter is not one to play at half speed. However, his indomitable spirit remains undeterred and with his characteristic determination and zeal he embraces this fresh challenge with open arms.

His sporting journey began in South Devon. Inspired by his mother, a PE teacher, young Peter excelled in a myriad of sports, including rugby, cricket and football. However, it was his prowess on the lawn tennis court that truly set him apart, as he quickly ascended through the ranks of area, county and regional standards with relative ease.

After a stint at Warwick
University, where he was runnerup in the British Universities Lawn
Tennis Championships, he made
the leap into professional lawn
tennis. His talent and hard work
brought him a commendable
world ranking of 970, and a UK
ranking of 21. Following his
tenure in professional lawn
tennis, and a return to rugby which ended with a broken rib
and punctured lung - he was
prompted to reassess his sporting
pursuits.

Remembering glimpses of Real Tennis from his junior days at Queen's Club, he felt drawn to the mystical sport of Kings. In

2001, at the age of 33, he embarked on a new chapter, immersing himself in the captivating world of amateur Real Tennis.

Throughout Peter's ascent and impressive career in the world of Real Tennis, he achieved many notable titles including the prestigious World Champion Over 50's crown, five Amateur Doubles titles, and the honour of representing and captaining Great Britain on three occasions in the esteemed Bathurst Cup.

But when asked what he feels are

his biggest successes, beyond the titles and accolades, Peter says it is the immense pride he has in his ability to compete at the highest echelons of the game. His competitive spirit is evidenced by his taking on and defeating younger, full-time professional players, even when well into his 50s. It's a testament to his skill, determination and enduring love for the sport.

In just a few short months, Peter has transitioned from Real Tennis stalwart to padel enthusiast, igniting a flame of passion that will burn brighter with every

Shorts' long journey

I introduced my son Jack to Real Tennis a few years ago and he's been part of the club's excellent junior programme. His interest in the game has grown and grown over the last year or so, as has his ability. It seemed only recently that I was giving him shots and taking it fairly easily on him when we played. Recently though, his handicap has dropped liked a stone and he's now giving me shots (although noticeably, not taking it easy on me!).

He recently turned 18 and wanted to play tennis on his birthday, so we booked a court at Hampton Court for an early start. This morphed into a plan to play other courts on the same day. We also fancied Seacourt on Hayling Island and catching up with Josh Smith at Holyport (Josh was Jack's first coach at RTC). We booked Seacourt at lunchtime and Holyport in the late afternoon, and planned our route. It was on Good Friday and it was going to be tight if there was lots of traffic, so we hoped the weather would be terrible to deter people from driving down to the coast.

The first game at Hampton Court began at 8.30am and I raced into a lead with a couple of quick wins, largely because Jack was still asleep. Unfortunately for me he woke up and started to reel me in, eventually winning 6-5, 2-1 after some hard-fought games. I didn't help myself by somehow managing to hit my own funny bone with my racquet in the penultimate game, but no excuses!

Onwards to the South Coast and Hayling Island. Luckily, it was pouring down and there wasn't much traffic; we had time to drive down to the beach before we played,. I'd arranged the court with Tim, one of the pros, and he looked after us very well, giving us a tour of their great facilities.

On the court there was a similar pattern to our first match: again I took a quick lead and felt revenge was on the cards. However, again Jack reeled me in and won the first set 6-5, ending 3-3 in the second set. At least I was getting closer to him though!

The court at Seacourt seemed to suit Jack's game very well, being

very skiddy. He often hits the ball very hard with a low trajectory close to the nick; this made a lot of his shots unreturnable for me. We both really enjoyed playing a new court. The picture of the Mary Rose on the grille is a really nice touch.

We hit the road again with a quick refuelling stop at GR Eggs, the choice of all the best athletes... It was a pleasant drive up to Holyport, near Maidenhead, particularly noting the traffic jams now heading down to the coast, as it was now an sunny Bank Holiday.

After a bit of confusion due to a Thames Water van obscuring the entrance to Holyport, we arrived at the final court of the day. We managed to get there a bit early and had a great catch up with Josh. Holyport is a hidden gem; the clubroom is a wonderful light and airy space.

I was starting to feel the effects of two matches and the driving (excuses in early!). Jack seemed to be as fresh as he was when he started and was, unfortunately for me, now wide awake (I'm sure he had a nap in the car!).

My hopes of a win in the final match were quickly extinguished with Jack winning 6-1, 6-2. I lost the ability to count in the third set but it felt like annihilation (75 minutes court time is too long, Josh!).

It was a great day, even if I was on my knees by the end, and I felt very lucky to have spent it with Jack - he has become a promising player. I think I need some more lessons to try and keep up - that's probably the last time we'll play off level!

The final tally was about 35 games to Jack and about 19 to me, and 160 miles covered. We're now planning to head up to Jesmond Dene via Leamington for our next road trip.

Many thanks to Tim and Josh for being so welcoming. I'd recommend anyone who gets the chance to go and play at both courts, as it was great to experience our wonderful sport in some different locations.

As many of you will know, after tendon repair surgery and since January I've been playing left-handed while rehabbing my right elbow. You can find me on RTO as "Lefty" Sheperdigian.

For those of you who suffer injuries to your playing arm, I can recommend trying the game out with the off-hand. It forces you to learn (re-learn) the basics, is good for your neural pathways, and you meet new people.

Our game's handicap system takes care of any deficits, of which there are several. Things don't work so well. That which was once simple becomes difficult. Overheads? Forget it! The safe bobble? It's a lottery; I've never double faulted so much! It's one thing to play friendlies and quite another to compete. In competition, sometimes, the machine breaks down in new, unexpected ways.

My new handicap allowed me to compete in the Category G held at

Oratory school on the 12-14th April. The Oratory facilities are extensive and impressive, including a Real Tennis court, which I can recommend for those looking for a game in the Reading area.

The tournament was straight knock-out with 15 competitors, all within 60-69 handicaps. Almost every match in the tournament was close and could have gone either way with just a few points. My first round was three sets, as was the final, with two matches in between on a knife edge.

Consequently, for the organisers it was two very long days (Ged Parsons on Saturday and the GOAT himself on Sunday). Admittedly, simply being on court under Rob Fahey's eye provided high motivation. We have no doubt about his playing ability yet his marking was no less impressive as he marked more than 11 hours without making an error!



Here's a picture after my seven hours on court. In the final I played Chris Blake of Wellington, who took me to the absolute limit! I'm pleased to report that despite being down 5-1 in the second set, I was able to claw back to level and managed to win the final set 6-4.
